Market Days Turns 25

June Ramirez remembers. She remembers how different downtown Harlingen looked when she opened the Antique & Artisan Emporium in 1991.

“There were a lot of buildings boarded up,” she said.

Back then, 25 years ago, business downtown wasn’t necessarily booming yet.

That’s when a few local merchants and downtown business owners came up with an idea to get more foot traffic downtown: Market Days was born.

“Business had really dropped, you know and so we needed to get people downtown,” Ramirez, who is also a dedicated member of the Market Days Committee, said. “It’s been an adventure.”

For 25 years, one of the Rio Grande Valley’s (the “Valley’s”) most beloved and longest-standing community market traditions, Market Days, has made its mark. Jackson Street transforms into a buzzing outdoor marketplace where attendees can find anything from antiques to handmade goods, food trucks, artwork, live music, and much more. The energetic buzz

of visitors and friendly vendors is something that attendees can surely look forward to. What began as a handful of vendors on Jackson Street between 4th Street and Commerce expanded to Centennial Park and W. Van Buren to accommodate another 80 vendors in 2021.

“About a year in, there were probably two blocks, which was maybe 20 vendors. It would depend

on how many we could get in a block. And we started out doing two blocks here and two blocks there because we wanted merchants to be able to have the Market Days in front of their stores so it would bring more people," Ramirez said. "But that's how it started out."

Now, Market Days boasts more than 160 vendors on the original Market Days side plus the Centennial Park expansion that Downtown Harlingen runs.

"We have vendors come and go," Ramirez said. "But most of them have been here 25 years. You know it's amazing that you can keep people for that long."

Lorena Rodriguez of Silly Dillys, a pickle vendor,

has been selling at Market Days for a year. She says she prefers this market over others in the Valley.

"We just recently turned about a year being a vendor there. That's my favorite market to do... Market Days is always a hit," she said.

Rodriguez and her husband Matthew, from Rio Hondo, are in the works of opening a storefront in Harlingen but don't see themselves slowing down any time soon as they hope to stay on as vendors at Market Days as well.

"It's very special because you see people from towns (from) all over the Valley here," Rodriguez said.

Market Days has become more than just

a shopping event – it's where commerce meets community.

Market Days occurs monthly on the first Saturday of the month from 9 am to 3 pm. It is a family- and pet-friendly event and a platform for small businesses.

After a couple of months of meeting with some of Harlingen's most established restaurants, I was very excited about getting to sit down, chat, and hopefully share some of that knowledge with one of our newest entrepreneurs, Gilberto Lucio, owner of The Other Room Wine Bar.

A Little Bit about the Owners

Gilberto aka Gilbert, Gil, and even Lucio to some, grew up in our neighboring city of San Benito. He left the Rio Grande Valley (the "Valley") in 1982 after joining the military, eventually settling in Denver and transitioning to the Reserves. Lucio then began his career as a police officer, quickly working his way up the ranks to detective. As fate would have it, a girl

from the Bronx, New York happened to be living in Denver during that same time. Lourdes and Gilbert, "Lindo" to her, would meet, tie the knot, move down to the Valley, and eventually open a wine bar.

Inspiration and the Name

Before his time in Denver, Gilbert had spent many years in the military living abroad in all parts of the world. Once married, he and Lourdes continued to travel, and still enjoy visiting new places regularly. So now as first-time small business owners I had to ask, why a wine bar?

The answer was simple. They wanted to offer something special. Something that resonated with them personally. They wanted to help create memories. Anytime Gilbert and Lourdes travel, the one constant was a visit to the

local wine bar in whatever city they visited. It was a time to relax and reflect on their time together. So that is exactly what they built.

My next question? You guessed it! Where did the name come from?

There's always something special when it comes to naming a business, especially if it's your first one, and when I heard the story behind this one, it all made sense.

Gilbert said it all came together for him when he met up with a friend he hadn't seen in years. After trying to talk through loud music and rambunctious kids running around a restaurant, they finally moved to another room where it was quieter with less distractions.

This got him thinking, he remembered being around family, and how often adults would move to another

room to talk. I'm sure it's the same in every culture, but especially in Mexican culture, get-togethers and events tend to be a little on the loud side. You often hear "Vamos al otro cuarto (Let's go to the other room)" or, somewhere quieter that we can talk and catch up. Or somewhere just a little more private. Gilbert said, "It's where the real connections happen." It was exactly the experience he and his wife had time and time again during their travels. After a long day spent in the hustle and bustle, they would find a relaxing wine venue where they could just sit and catch up, and that's how The Other Room Wine Bar got its name.

The Venue and its Menu

weekday lunch buffet for \$10.99, which includes coffee or tea and tortillas. They are located at 318 W. Jackson in downtown Harlingen.


The new Wendy's being constructed at 902 N. 77 Sunshine Strip started hiring for positions in early December.

"I actually went to go check it out and map the run," she said. "I feel like it was meant to be, and I really enjoyed the space. It's great! The trail is awesome."


Garces' positivity radiates when she speaks about the event and her experience helping women at her studio as she highlights the

Second Chance Thrift Store: Serving the Community, One Sale at a Time

On Saturday mornings, the doors of Second Chance Thrift Store open to more than just bargain hunters. They open to a community built on a sense of purpose that goes far beyond making a sale. Dena Herrera, the store's manager and volunteer, is usually right in the middle of it all, thriving in what she calls the "hustle and bustle" of the space.

Dena's journey with Second Chance began simply. "I love thrift stores. I walked in. They said, 'We need volunteers,' so the next Saturday I started." Eight months later, the store needed a manager. Despite not being a member of First Methodist Church, Dena was encouraged to step into

the role due to her passion for the project.

Second Chance Thrift Store itself was also born out of opportunity. The space that houses the store was donated to the church. However, it remained empty for a few years before church volunteers decided to turn it into a donation-based thrift

shop to help the community. What started as an idea soon became a massive ministry project of First Methodist Church.

The name "Second Chance" reflects the heart of the store's mission. "The ladies that started the store wanted to give items that were donated a second

chance to help other people," Dena said.

What sets the store apart from other thrifts in the area is a combination of affordability, quality, and purpose.

As it is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit entity, proceeds from the thrift store are reinvested locally,

supporting church needs as well as ministries and charities throughout the city of Harlingen. However, Dena emphasized that the store operates independently. She estimates about two thirds of the volunteers do not go to the church, highlighting how the store has grown into a community-wide effort.

Second Chance also serves as a place of connection. "We see customers every week... we know a lot of them by name," Dena said.

With approximately 27 rooms, the work is constant. "[Volunteers] sort the stuff... we tag the clothes... organize, hang up, put the items out for sale," Dena said. Saturdays, especially during Market Days and summer months, are when help is needed most.

Looking ahead, Dena hopes to continue improving

the store for customers so the cycle of giving can continue. "We want to continue bettering the store for customers so that they keep coming back and

we can keep giving to the community," she said.

At Second Chance Thrift Store, every item, every volunteer, and every shopper

plays a role in a mission rooted in service—proof that sometimes the most meaningful impact comes from giving something a second chance. ♦

Me Vale Creations: Conchas, Chanclas, y Cultura

For Sarah Lee Soria, art has not been just about aesthetics — it is about survival, memory, and shared cultural experiences.

Her business, Me Vale Creations, is instantly recognizable across the Rio Grande Valley (RGV). The recuerdos woven into her work resonate with many Chicano millennials who feel her designs were lifted straight from Mama's cocina or Welita's living room. Behind the humor and nostalgia, however, is a story rooted in resilience.

Nearly a decade ago, Sarah and her husband were laid off. Bills piled up, and stability felt out of

reach. Around the same time, her grandmother died, leaving behind arts and crafts supplies that would unknowingly become the foundation of a new business.

"I remember I sat there and I wanted to sculpt, and I said, 'Well, my kids love pan dulce,'" Sarah said.

She sculpted a concha and posted it on Facebook. The response was immediate.

"My friends hyped it up. They shared it. Orders started coming in, and then that money got used for more orders," Sarah said.

From there, Me Vale Creations grew organically and eventually expanded into a full online storefront. What began as a necessity

became momentum. Etsy orders poured in, followed by a standalone website and an expanding product line that includes air fresheners, drink cozies, blankets, pins, stickers, candles, and more.

During COVID-19, growth was explosive. That rapid growth, she said, led to burnout. Still, she takes pride in seeing culturally rooted items now created by other artists.

"You go to Etsy, you type in 'concha keychain,' and you'll see more than 50 people making them now," she said. "And it's good, because it's inspiring. That

means our cultura is spreading everywhere."

Currently, Me Vale Creations is temporarily housed at the Antique Emporium located at 123 E. Jackson, offering shoppers a chance to see Sarah's work up close while she plans the next phase of her business. That same perseverance shows up in the name of the business itself. "Me vale" means much more than "I don't care"—it's a mindset shaped by grit and determination.

"[Me vale] means we're nonstop grinders," Sarah said. "As Mexicanos, we don't care—not in a rude way—we just keep grinding. We've got to wake up and go to work tomorrow. We don't have time for [drama]."

Inspired by the uniqueness of RGV culture, Sarah's designs are relatable and recognizable, with food serving as her central source of inspiration.

"The food—that's the soul of the RGV," she said.

Sarah's art also brings to life familiar sayings like "Ponte Vicks" and "Hay comida en la casa," while

also celebrating iconic moments—like the ever-feared flying chancla—using humor to connect generations.

Children recognizing the designs, parents laughing at the references, and repeat customers bringing friends all reinforce why Sarah continues her hustle. "That means the tradition is getting passed down," she said. "That's what we're supposed to do."

After a period of creative block and personal change, including welcoming her youngest child, Sarah is intentionally slowing down and returning to what made Me Vale Creations special: handmade work rooted in Valley pride.

"I want to stop the manufactured stuff and continue with only the handmade stuff," she said. "That's something other businesses can't replicate. I want to be able to put a stamp that says 'Made in the RGV.' That way, I'm RGV proud."

Me Vale Creations is built around shared experiences within a

community, and Sarah is clear about who kept her going through her lowest moments.

"My customers motivate me. They've never given up on me," she said. "If it wasn't for their support, especially at my lowest, I wouldn't continue doing what I'm doing."

In every concha and familiar phrase, Sarah Lee Soria preserves the moments that connect generations of Chicanos across the RGV. Me Vale Creations isn't just about what we carry on our keychains—it's about the memories we carry with us, long after the moment has passed.♦

MMA Fighting Leathernecks: The Champs

I have previously written that winning a state championship or being part of a state championship winning team is every Texas high school athlete's dream. At the beginning of the 2025 Texas high school football season, our community had high hopes and expectations for the Harlingen Cardinals and the Harlingen South Hawks football teams to compete in a state championship game. Both football teams had good seasons, advancing to the Texas UIL state football playoffs. However, our beloved Cards and Hawks fell short of making it to a state championship game.

Fortunately, in our community, we have another football program in Harlingen with a rich history and reputation as a perennial powerhouse football team. The Fighting Leathernecks of the Marine Military Academy (MMA) reached the pinnacle of high school football during their most recent season by winning the 2025 Texas Christian Athletic League's (TCAL's) State Football Championship. That's right! Our city is home to the



2025 TCAL State Football Champions.

The History

History has proven that our city is more than capable of producing state champions. We have had state champions in Speech/Drama, Powerlifting, Band, Junior Reserve Officer's Training Corp, and Track & Field but never in football,

until now. It appears that MMA is the first football team from Harlingen to win a state football championship.

Since 1965, MMA has maintained a strong presence in Harlingen, consistently integrating military discipline with high-level competition to develop accomplished teams and outstanding individual

talent. My recollection of the MMA football teams in the early 1980s consisted of tough teams with talented players that could easily compete and beat any team in the Rio Grande Valley (RGV) and most football teams throughout the state in their competition class.

Based on its tradition and history of producing talented high school

football players, including some talented enough to play in the National Football League, it doesn't surprise me that the MMA football team won a state championship. But how was the 2025 team able to be the first MMA football team in their storied history to win a state championship?

New Head Coach

In August 2025, Coach Israel "Izzy" Gracia was hired as the head coach at MMA. Coach Gracia is no stranger to building a football program. He has dedicated his entire life to football. Coach Gracia, who recently retired as the head football coach at Santa Maria High School, has more than 32 years of high school football coaching experience. He has worked at Santa Maria ISD, Los Fresnos ISD, Rio Hondo ISD, Hidalgo ISD, and San Perlita ISD. He played football at Los Fresnos

High School (Class of 1989) and Texas A&I University (now known as Texas A&M Kingsville).

I asked Coach Gracia how he was able to take over a program in August and win a state championship in November. Coach Gracia quickly gave credit to the staff and their contributions to building the championship culture. He proudly gave credit to his players and their ability to adapt to adversity and overcome the challenges faced throughout the season. Coach Gracia also credited the amazing support from the MMA leadership, students, and fans.

The Challenges

Coach Gracia accepted the head coaching position at MMA knowing that the program inherently posed several challenges. First and foremost, MMA has always been known as an

institution of excellence, discipline, and character that, back in the day, always had a formidable athletic program in all sports, and especially in football. From my personal experience, it appeared that MMA players were always much bigger, faster, and stronger and MMA teams were always so tough to play against and hard to beat. The history of MMA football and the desire to get back to the glory days of winning and the expected standard of performance was a challenge for Coach Gracia.

Another challenge for Coach Gracia was the players. Unlike traditional high school programs, MMA enrollment is based on local, national, and global enrollment, which constantly changes every year. There could be an All-State player on the roster one year who doesn't come back to MMA the following year. Coach Gracia faced a big challenge of not knowing which players would be returning, nor did he have any insight of the new players entering the program. Coach Gracia and his staff needed to rapidly evaluate their players, ensuring they matched the team's culture, system, and team chemistry, while also developing the necessary skills for each position to create a successful team. Additionally, MMA starts football practice two weeks

after all other high school programs and played their first football game for the 2025 season after only 10 football practices.

Lastly, Coach Gracia had to assemble a new football coaching staff, with only one MMA coach from the 2024 team, Coach John Flores, returning.

The Process

Coach Gracia recognized that establishing a successful program at MMA required assembling an outstanding team of coaches.

Coach Gracia brought in former Santa Maria High School quarterback (QB) Jesse Ortiz as QB coach, added experienced Coach Ruben Cortez as Defensive Coordinator, and completed the 2025 MMA football staff with Coach Castillo, Coach John Flores, and volunteer Coach Mora.

With only 34 players, the MMA coaching staff then focused on helping the team build trust, work together, and gain confidence in their abilities. Coach Gracia mentioned that failure invites change, allowing for more focus to change leading to "buy in." Coach Gracia believes in and promotes a "team first" mindset and team accomplishments in lieu of individual achievements.

I asked Coach Gracia to describe their season and how they were able to win

a state championship. He said that the 2025 MMA football season was one of continual evolution. There were some highs and some lows with several “glimpses of success.” Coach Gracia mentioned the team had great wins, tough losses, and a lot of growth during games when the team experienced adversity. The coaching staff emphasized learning from setbacks and encouraged the team not to give up when games went poorly.

The 2025 MMA team experienced several injuries, forcing some players to play on both sides of the ball on offense and defense. The team had to put “all hands-

on deck” to achieve their goals.

Coach Gracia’s approach was for his players to have fun and enjoy playing the game and with each other. He managed difficulty and losses by accepting full responsibility when his team did not play to their potential, always using these situations as opportunities to learn from mistakes.

Coach Gracia remembers the precise moment his team encountered adversity in a regular season game. Rather than losing their composure, the team remained determined, refused to give up, and continued fighting, ultimately securing the win.

During that game, Coach

was a great leader and was recognized as the Most Valuable Player of the TCAL State Championship game. With a 104.0 QB rating, Dash completed 52 percent of his passes with 19 touchdown passes. Dash also led the team in rushing yards and averaged 60 yards a game, scoring six (6) rushing touchdowns.

Brandon Smith led the wide receivers with 81.1 yards per game and scored 14 touchdowns overall (11 receiving touchdowns) and was an integral part of the MMA offense.

Colten Clark led the defense as their Linebacker and led the team with an

average of 8.1 tackles per game, and **Luke Estell** led the team with interceptions helping to bolster the MMA defense, which included linebacker, **Mason Neeslein**.

Game. On November 15, 2025, MMA played against the Texas Legacy Football Academy in Buda, Texas and won the game 44–42. Coach Gracia

expressed pride in his team's performance, noting that they began the game with energy, encountered challenges when they fell behind, but ultimately rallied to secure the victory. Coach Gracia commended his players and their strong winning spirit.

The 2025 MMA football team excelled at overcoming: overcoming changes, adversity, past performance, and lack of confidence. Not everyone can say they are a state champion, but the 2025 Fighting Leathernecks of the Marine Military Academy in Harlingen, Texas can and we are all so proud of them. Happy New Year! After enjoying all the delicious holiday dishes, I like to start my New Year with some easily digestible meals. One of my favorites is Chicken Caldo. Packed full of veggies and protein, it will help make you feel full without all the extra calories.

Ingredients:

- 4 large chicken thighs
- 2 stalks celery, diced)
- 2 large carrots, diced)
- Seasonings: Palmful of salt, pepper, chicken seasoning, and crushed garlic
- Handful of cilantro
- 2 large limes, sliced
- Half a cabbage
- 2 calabaza zucchinis
- 3 bottles of water

8. Let it sit for 10 minutes and then it's ready to serve.


I like to enjoy this soup with a couple slices of limes, which adds the finishing touches to this delicious dish.


